

### FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Families,

Thank you for making me feel so welcome. It's been wonderful to meet so many of you already, and to see friendly faces in the yard before and after school. This is an amazing learning community and I'm grateful to be a part of it for the next five years. I began my career here at Newbery Park Primary School 17 years ago, so it's a familiar environment. For the past 15 years I have been teaching and leading at Millicent North Primary School, where I worked mostly in the primary team as a 5/6/7 teacher. I am particularly passionate about Literacy and Numeracy, but at the heart of all things education, I firmly believe strong relationships are the key to success. This includes between home and school, so please come and speak with me if you have any concerns. 





# **Red-Tail Black Cockatoo**



### Reading at Home





## **READING – How you can help at home** Article 6 – Reading with Reluctant Readers

Many children lose the joy of reading when reading seems hard. If reading time is about spending a fun time together, and has a playful element to it, then it can become less of a chore.

Here are some things you can do to make reading at home more focused on enjoying reading together.

- 1. **Environment matters** choose a place where you and your child can be comfortable and are unlikely to be distracted or interrupted. Make sure your child knows that this is a time where they have your full attention.
- 2. Book choices this is going to vary depending on the skill level the child is at:
  - a. **Beginning readers** Get your child to choose books that they think they will enjoy. The aim is for the child to hear books that will develop a love of stories. When children first start learning to recognise letters and their sounds they have a limited number of words they can read. The teacher may send home some word lists that the child can read using the sounds they have learnt. Making a game out of reading these words can help keep it fresh and fun.
  - b. **Developing readers** when children have built up the number of letter/sound combinations they know they will start bringing home "decodable texts". The books only have words that use the sounds the child has learnt (plus some "tricky words" that they have been taught). Reading time might combine this book with a fun book they enjoy.
  - c. Independent readers encourage your child to choose books they will enjoy. The school library and the public library provide a great range of books.
- 3. **Supporting reading** if your child is reluctant to read or having difficulty with the book, try one of these strategies:
  - a. **Echo Reading** parent reads a phrase or sentence, then the child repeats it. Make sure the child is looking at the words and pointing with their finger as you go.
  - b. Shared Reading Take it in turns. Parent reads a sentence or page, then the child reads the next one.
  - c. *Mimic reading* the parent reads with slow fluency, moving their finger across the words at a steady pace, and the child mimics them a second or so behind. If the child looks away from the book, keep reading, they will probably return their attention to the book.
  - d. *Paired Reading* the parent and child read at the same time. The parent sets the pace using a normal reading voice.
