
It was fun seeing the stalactites and the reflection from the water. - Rhys










Reading at Home



READING – How you can help at home Article 6 – Decoding Skills

When children start learning to read they learn to recognise the symbols we use (letters) and the sounds that they make. We call this the **alphabetic code**.

All the letters in our alphabet have a matching sound.

Sometimes two letters together make 1 sound eg. /sh/ or /ow/. These are called *digraphs*. We also have *trigraphs*, three letters making one sound (eg /igh/) and a few *quadgraphs*, four letters making one sound (eg /ough/).

When children know the sounds that letters make they can **decode** most of the words in the English language.

When your child is reading and they get stuck on a word or read it incorrectly, you can follow these steps to support them:

- **Step 1** Give them time to self-correct. Sometimes they will need thinking time.
- **Step 2** Draw their attention to the written word and the sounds that are represented by the letters in the word. Encourage them to look carefully and give a prompt about the sounds eg "The letters 'ai' together say/ay/. Now have another try." *Unusual or tricky words should just be given*.
- **Step 3** If they are still unable to read the word after prompting, tell them the word and keep going to supporting understanding and enjoyment of the book.

It is important to praise children for using their "sounding out" skills, whether they are successful or not.
